One thing we often explore is the choice of modular versus stick-built homes. In addition to designing and building custom homes and working from architects' plans, Integrity has extensive experience in modular home finishing as well as several second-story additions to existing homes. We find modular homes to be

a great option for clients who have strict budgets or time constraints, but there are many other advantages.

Quality Control

Integrity is the regional representative for Huntington Homes, a custom modular home manufacturer in East Montpelier, Vermont. "What sets Huntington Homes apart is their quality construction and great service department," explains Integrity owner and designer, Heidi Flanders. "They build houses the same way we would stick-build a house, except they are able to do it in the controlled environment of their 100,000-square-foot warehouse. Building in a quality-controlled shop eliminates weather-related delays and exposure of materials to the elements, saving time and money. Typically, a modular home can be built in one third the time it takes to build a site-built house, depending on the complexity of the home."

Design Flexibility

Huntington Homes offers house plans in many styles: ranch, colonial, cape, high-posted cape, saltbox, and gambrel, all of which can be customized. Huntington can also custom design a house, or Heidi can design a home and have Huntington build from her plans. When designing a modular home, Integrity visits the site to be sure it is appropriate for the project. We price the home both as modular and stick-built to see which benefits the customer more. As with any project, the level of finish and materials selected affect the home's final cost.

Huntington offers a basic finish package to start, and clients add custom finishes as desired. Working side-by-side with the client and Huntington Homes, we manage all these details at each step

Construction and Setting

With approved plans and a signed contract in hand, Huntington Homes starts construction, and clients are welcome to visit Huntington's Vermont warehouse to see their house being built. Meanwhile, Integrity places the foundation and readies the site for delivery. Once factory construction is complete, Huntington Homes delivers the modules to the site, and crews from Integrity and Huntington Homes set the modules on the foundation.

"The day our home arrived was like being an expectant set of parents... our hopes and dreams were now tangible

and sitting on our land. With the efforts of a very knowledgeable crew, they impressed us with the team effort it took to get the "set" correct to within a very small fraction of an inch," said Integrity clients Lisa and Michael Moore. There is an element of instant gratification

when building a modular home.

Once the modules are set on the foundation, the client can walk through the home the same day. Integrity then begins the buttoning-up process, which includes marrying the walls of the modules together, opening up walls and doorways, filling in drywall, flooring, siding, and roofing. As the general contractor, Integrity coordinates electrical and plumbing connections, as well as installation of the heating system. Integrity can also build porches, decks, and garages that aren't included in the modular package.

Larry Roux, Huntington Homes' general sales manager, explains, "We want to work with preferred contractors, like Integrity, who have experience dealing with our product and a reputation for customer service. What's most important to us is that our contractors follow through with customer service and warranty work. We've been working with Integrity since 2003, and we have a comfort level with them because they take care of customer concerns and any warranty work if it does come up."
